**Subject: Maths**  
Focus: Counting in 5s

Example:

These flowers all have 5 petals each.



How many flowers are there?

How many petals are there?

Count in 5s to help you work out the number of petals.

Top tip

Counting in 5s helps you learn to multiply by 5.

So, 5 flowers with 5 petals each is the same as saying:

$5 \times 5 = 25$  petals

Counting in 5s gives you the 5 times table!



**Subject: English**  
Focus:  
Use phonics to develop vocabulary.

Let's create a list.

When you go shopping, you will notice that food and drink comes in lots of different packaging. Have a look online or in your kitchen and try listing items you have into the following sections:

- Cardboard Box
- Plastic Box
- Plastic Bottle
- Glass Jar
- Tin Can

See how many items you can find for each material around your home.

- Once you've completed your list, pick five items from your list and write a sentence for them.
- Make sure you use at least one of the following word endings in each of your sentences: er, ed, es, ll, or ly.
- Use capital letters and punctuation correctly.

For example: **Baked beans are tightly packed into a tin can.**

- Butter
- Orange squash
- Jam
- Baked beans

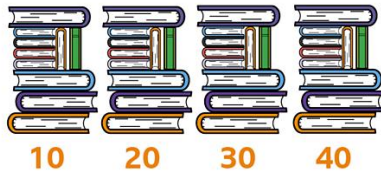
**Subject: Maths**  
Focus: Counting in 10s

Here is a pile of 10 books.



Can you count in tens to find how many books there are in 4 piles?



Let's count them:

10, 20, 30, 40

You can see that there are 40 books in 4 piles of 10.

You can also write this as a repeated addition.

$$10 + 10 + 10 + 10 = 40$$

How many piles would there be if you had 70 books?

Count in 10s to help you.

You would have 70 books in 7 piles of 10.

You can also write this as a repeated addition.

$$70 = 10 + 10 + 10 + 10 + 10 + 10 + 10$$

**Subject: English**  
Focus: To ask questions.

You can identify questions in writing because they always end with a question mark.

Questions often start with 'W' words: **Who, What, When, Where** and **Why**. But, questions can also start with lots of other words. Here are some examples: **Can, Could, If, Will** and **Should**.

Write six questions. Once you've written your questions you can ask people in your house to see if they know the answer.

The questions can be about anything. It might be something you've learnt recently or something you want to learn.

Make sure you use capital letters and question marks.

Try and start each question with a different word.

Top tip

Instead of counting up in 10s, you can multiply by 10, which is a more efficient way of doing the same calculation.

So, 7 piles of 10 books is the same as saying:

$$7 \times 10 = 70 \text{ books}$$

Counting in 10s gives you the 10 times table!

Statements are usually punctuated with a full stop but can also use an exclamation mark. For example: <b>The cat ran away down the street.</b> Commands can be punctuated with a full stop or an exclamation mark. For example: <b>Fetch me my cat.</b> A question sentence can only be punctuated with a question mark at the end. For example: <b>Have you found my cat yet?</b> An exclamation sentence can only be punctuated with an exclamation mark.
