






What is Fairtrade about?




- Fairtrade makes sure that farmers get paid **fairly** for the work that they do and for the things they grow, such as coffee, cocoa and cotton.
- When you buy Fairtrade products, you make a difference to farmers and workers around the world, and the planet.

For 2 weeks each year schools come together to spread the word about Fairtrade and to learn about the people who grow our food and drinks, mine our gold and who grow the cotton in our clothes - people who do not get paid enough.

- This year for Fairtrade Fortnight, we are asking YOU to BE THE CHANGE.
- It's more than just being aware.
- It's about an active choice to support Fairtrade farmers and workers around the world, wherever possible, to ensure they can earn a fairer wage.

The story of Dabilla



I did not have the chance to continue my studies, but with Fairtrade and our plantations, I can pay for the children's studies. This is my pride, because the children are the future.' Dabilla is a Fairtrade cocoa farmer in Côte d'Ivoire.

He has been a cocoa farmer for over 30 years.

Dabilla's greatest pride are his children.

Farmers who grow the cocoa can earn as little as 80p per day. It's just not enough to meet their basic needs. But with Fairtrade, Dabilla's gets a Fairtrade Minimum Price for his cocoa and a Fairtrade Premium with which his community was able to build a school, canteen and install a water pump.

We learn about how we can make the world a kinder, fairer and better place for everyone to live in.

How can we change the world and ensure that farmers get a fair wage?

Try to think of:

- ▶ 1 choice our school can make to make a positive change in the world.
- 1 choice our class can make to make a positive change in the world.
- ▶ 1 choice you can make to make a positive change in the world.



You choose a school uniform that uses Fairtrade cotton. Your choice means cotton farmers in countries such as India and China, are paid a fair price for the cotton they produce.

You choose to bake using Fairtrade ingredients. Your choice means that the cocoa farmers, vanilla farmers and sugar farmers who grew your ingredients will be paid a fair price.

You and your family choose a beautiful bunch of Fairtrade sunflowers for your living room. Your choice means that flower workers in countries such as Kenya, Ethiopia and Sri Lanka get money to spend on healthcare, education or other needs.

You choose a Fairtrade banana to have at snack time. Your choice means banana farmers in countries such as Colombia and the Dominican Republic have more money to meet the needs of their communities.

You choose to recycle your rubbish.

Your choice means your rubbish is made into something new! You've protected animals and their habitats from being harmed by litter.

You choose to take your old clothes to a charity shop instead of putting them in the rubbish bin. Your choice has saved your clothes from ending up in a landfill. Landfills produce toxic gases that cause climate change. Your choice has also made a charity shopper very happy!


Let's make our own tree of promises


