

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## What Is LGBT+ History Month?

LGBT+ History Month is a month-long annual celebration of lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, non-binary and queer history, including the history of LGBTQ+ rights and related civil rights movements.

The aim of LGBT+ History Month is to teach people what the past has been like for the LGBTQ+ community, celebrate achievements and work for a fair, equal future where everyone is treated with kindness and respect.

#### What Is This Year's Theme?

Each year, there is a different theme for LGBT+ History Month. The theme highlights and celebrates a different aspect of LGBTQ+ history.

The theme for LGBT+ History Month 2025 is:

'Activism and Social Change #SocialActivism'

**Activism** is the activity of working to achieve political or social change.

This theme aims to acknowledge that the LGBTQ+ community is strongly tied with activism. While there has been a lot of social change already that has improved the lives of LGBTQ+ people, there is still a long way to go, particularly when it comes to equality for marginalised groups.

#### **LGBTQ+ History**

In many ancient cultures and medieval eastern cultures, homosexuality was accepted. There is evidence of relationships between individuals of the same sex going back as far as recorded history. Many indigenous and native cultures also recognised homosexuality and gender non-conformity as a normal part of the human experience. Some communities even had respected social roles for these individuals.

Attitudes towards homosexuality became more intolerant in parts of Europe during the Middle Ages and these attitudes were often spread to other parts of the world through European colonialism. There were even laws put in place to criminalise homosexuality.

## **LGBTQ+ Activism**

When it comes to activism and protests for social change in relation to LGBTQ+ rights, much of this took place in the 20<sup>th</sup> century and has continued to the modern day.



## Marsha P Johnson and Sylvia Rivera



Marsha P Johnson and Sylvia Rivera were American drag performers and advocates for gay rights.



Rivera also campaigned for transgender people to be included in the Sexual Orientation Non-Discrimination Act in New York.

#### **Paul Patrick and Sue Sanders**




Paul Patrick and Sue Sanders are LGBTQ+ rights activists and co-chairs of Schools OUT UK and LGBT+ History Month in the UK.



Sue Sanders has worked throughout her career to raise awareness of LGBTQ+ issues, as well as supporting LGBTQ+ people in the criminal justice system.

## **Lucia Blayke**



Lucia Blayke was part of a collective group of transgender and gender non-conforming people who established London Trans Pride in 2019, inspired by Trans Pride Brighton.

## **Phyll Opoku-Gyimah**



Phyll Opoku-Gymiah, also known as Lady Phyll, is known for her racial, gender and LGBTQ+ activism. She is co-founder and chief executive of UK Black Pride and former executive director of Kaleidoscope Trust, a nonprofit organisation that campaigns for the human rights of LGBTQ+ people around the world.

## **LGBTQ+ Activism and Social Change**

- Throughout modern history, LGBTQ+ activism has been the force that has enacted social change and improved the lives of LGBTQ+ people.
- ❖Throughout the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> centuries, LGBTQ+ rights movements have led to law changes that work towards LGBTQ+ equality, as well as changes in how LGBTQ+ people are perceived by society and the opportunities that are available to them.
- ❖These movements have helped work towards ending stigma that affects LGBTQ+ people and ensuring the rights of LGBTQ+ people across the world.
- ❖Sadly, there are still many areas in which activism and social change still need to take place.
- ❖In the UK, negative attitudes towards LGBTQ+ people are sometimes used as a political tool, sparking unnecessary hatred and negatively impacting the safety and equality of all people, not just LGBTQ+ people.
